2011 SNOWSHOE RACING SEASON Backtothe Future by Laura Clark

n the Stephen Spielberg trilogy, Back to the Future, a Leenager travels through time and must correct the results of his interference, lest his present become mere speculation. While for now this remains mere conjecture, it is interesting to note how fluid past, present, and future are even in a pre-time travel era.

We all know that prehistoric migrants crossed the Bering Sea on snowshoes, that early French explorers raquetted their way to North American fur trade empires, and that Rogers' Rangers, the original Special Forces unit, achieved enviable winter snowshoe maneuverability in the French and Indian War.

However, the extent to which the more recent past has jettisoned from present knowledge was brought to my attention by my Saratoga Library used book store discov ery of The Snowshoe Book, authored by William Osgood and Leslie Hurley, veterans of World War II's storied 10th Mountain Division. Well before the recent resurgence of sleeker models, snowshoeing thrived throughout early 20th century Canada and New England.

Competition consisted of track events supplemented by a longer "forced march" of one-mile. It is truly mindboggling to imagine running in raquetts at least ten inches wide and 33 inches long compared to modern 7-inch by 21-inch running models. Amazingly, the best sprint times were only seconds off current sneaker track

records, but as the distances got longer, lag time predictably increased. I was even more impressed, however, by the sheer inventiveness of earlier enthusiasts, as evidenced by black and white photos of snowshoe hurdlers. One Corinth resident told me of the "bigfoot softball" games of his youth, the main hazards being losing the white ball in a snowbank and backing up to catch a fly. The authors also describe several family snowshoe games. One, "Fox

and Geese," involves patterning a large circle with wagon

wheel spokes. Generally, the fox sticks to the middle try-

ing to catch the circling geese. This was a game my Mom

played with all the neighborhood children, albeit in boots, and I can't help but wonder if she had seen it snowshoed when she was a girl.

Closer to the spirit of the Northeast's 2011 Dion Snowshoe Series at dionsnowshoes.com for runners and walkers, however, were New England's early snowshoe clubs. Participants would meet once or twice a week with a different member responsible for selecting the route. At the halfway mark they would stop at a farmhouse or inn for supper and then hike back by a different path, preferably one which included a fun downhill slide. Details are sketchy so I can only wonder if the groups tested the newly invented electric flashlight or if they were more adept than us at seeing in the dark.

While our snowshoe race series is strictly a daylight venture, some of the same folks tend to attend week after week, making for a friendly family atmosphere. Most outings are followed by a hearty feast, with participants taking turns supplying their specialties. With one two events scheduled every week throughout New York, western Massachusetts and New England, individual race directors take care to showcase scenic landforms and historical features of their particular area, and often tweak the route from year to year. The Western Massachusetts Snowshoe Series, sponsored by Dion Snowshoes, has events in Massachusetts, New York and New Hampshire. Visit runwmac.com for the latest updates and to review past SnoNews for "fact, fiction and otherworldly gossip."


Despite the passage of time, however, we still know how to innovate. Last year, for example, Jim Carlson of the Saratoga Stryders introduced the "target" by affixing a black and white shooter's bullseye to the back of a standard orange safety vest. The person who was "it" would slip on the target and then pass it to someone else at the next race. I must admit I thought it a screwball idea, but since Jim was my friend, I good-naturedly donned the vest thinking that I only would have to do it once.

Amazingly, the target functioned somewhat like Clark

When cross-country skiers and snow-shoe enthusiasts return to their favorite Nordic ski centers each winter they are ready to enjoy their winter sport, but also to see what's new. Every center performs maintenance tasks during the non-snow months like painting and repairing buildings and equipment. Changes such as new trails, new groomers, trail widening, and spruced-up lodges will be obvious, while other area improvements will be appreciated as more efficient and pleasurable skiing days are experienced.

At Lapland Lake Nordic Vacation Center, near Northville instructors and staff are ready to assist as you return to the trails or venture into skinny skiing for the first time. They've added 2.5K of new ski trails while several trails were redesigned and widened by owner/operator Olavi Hirvonen. The wider trails will accommodate the new Husky Snowcat groomer and offer an improved surface for skate skiing. The gentle Lake Trail is illuminated nightly for overnight guests and for the general public on some Saturday nights. Several improvements have been made to the Finnish-style tupas (cottages). Lapland Lake offers lunch and dinner at Tuulen Tupa Grill and après-ski activities. They offer free season passes to children 17 and under when a parent purchases a pass. In addition to skiing and snowshoeing, Lapland has sledding, ice skating, snow tubing, wilderness ski touring, kick sledding, and napakikku on the ice pond. Pulk sleds are also available for parents planning to bring along infants and small children. Visit: laplandlake.com.

Pineridge Cross Country Ski Area in East Poestenkill offers 35K of groomed trails for classic skiing, 20K of lanes packed for skating, and 15K left ungroomed for great snowshoeing. Owner, Walter Kersch, said skiers will now be able to ski all of Scouting Trail and a new trail called, Loop 'd Loop. When schools are closed, kids and adults are encouraged to "dig out" and go to Pineridge to earn special snow day discounts. At the Pineridge Ski Fest

on Jan. 8-8, they will provide free beginner lessons and a free clinic on downhill technique. Pineridge will continue to offer waxing clinics, learn to ski days, moonlight ski/snowshoe tours, a woman's ski day, and guided snowshoe hikes. This year Pineridge and the non-profit Rensselaer Plateau Nordic will be assisting families with an affordable opportunity for children in an entry-level, recreation ski program (rensselaerplateaunordic.org). Visit: pineridgexc.com.

Art Jubin, owner of **Cascade Cross Country Ski Center** near Lake Placid, is entering his 32nd year providing excellent Nordic skiing on 20K of groomed trails. From Cascade, skiers can connect with the Olympic Sports Complex and Jackrabbit trails. Cascade's popular full-service restaurant has spectacular mountain views, and they have a complete ski shop for rentals and sales and several cozy bunk rooms. You can join the locals who will celebrate Full Moon Parties on Jan. 22 and Feb. 19 with a moonlight ski/snow-shoe tour featuring bonfires, food/drink and live music. Visit: cascadeski.com.

At Garnet Hill Lodge and Vacation Center in North River, owner Mary Donnellan and staffers are busily preparing the 55K of trails. The vast system offers a wide variety of experiences, from gentle flats and slopes to wilderness ski trips, including their guided ski tours from Gore Mountain back to Garnet Hill. Ice skating, tobogganing, "ski-shoeing," and dog sledding are available, as well as ski/ snowshoe rentals and lessons from their ski shop. The Log House Lodge offers an opportunity for an experience of what life was like at one of the grand hotels with its cozy rooms, homemade meals, and the ambiance of an Adirondack ski lodge. Visit: garnet-hill.com.

At the **Olympic Sports Complex** outside Lake Placid, skiing Mt Van Hoevenberg's Olympic trails can be a thrill on the same groomed trails skied by many American and international ski champions, including local Nordic Combined silver and gold medalist, Billy Demong, and

world champion biathlete, Tim Burke. Take a lesson with instructors from the center's ski school. With their Biathlon Clinics you can take a freestyle lesson and then head over to the biathlon range to learn about the Nordic rifle and ski sport – and test your shooting skills. The 29th annual Lake Placid Loppet featuring 25K and 50K classic and freestyle racing is Feb. 5. Visit: whitefacelakeplacid.com.

At the **Dewey Mountain Recreation Center** near Saranac Lake, Billy Demong recently took part in the Build a New Lodge Campaign at his hometown ski area to build a lodge that better serves Dewey's expanding uses. "We have come to recognize that Dewey has served for many years as a training ground for lots of great Nordic skiers," said Steve Doxzon, owner of Adirondack Lakes and Trails Outfitters, who manages Dewey in the winter. The Dewey Mountain Youth Ski League recently used the center's Facebook account to showcase "Moose Juice" a video of ski games showing that "Learning to crosscountry ski can be great fun." The warming lodge offers rental skis/snowshoes and hot beverages. Visit: deweyskicenter.com.

Osceola Tug Hill Cross-Country Ski Center in Camden receives an average of 300 inches (25 feet!) of snow on the 40K trail system. They now boast "The largest selection of cross-country ski equipment in New York," that's 450 pairs of skis, boots

and poles. "We have lots of rental equipment, and when you buy here we apply all rental fees paid to the purchase price," said owner Hugh Quinn. They invested in heavy-duty snow grooming equipment, which quickly turns the big snowfalls into super conditions. "Ski aficionados from the region as well as other states flock to Osceola for our consistently enjoyable snow," Hugh claims. This season, Osceola has a new ski trail – and cell phone service. Snowshoeing is not allowed. Visit: uxcski.com.

At **Tree Haven Trails** in Hagaman, Bob's Trees is where you can find 42K of groomed classic and skate ski trails, as well as four miles of snowshoe trails. Owner Bob Eaton's trails meander through evergreens, woods and brooks. Tree Haven has a warming lodge with snack bar and rentals. Visit: bobstrees.com.

Oak Hill Farms Cross-Country Ski Center in Esperance, offers 30K of groomed trails that wind through woods, orchards and open fields with great views. Oak Hill is open on weekends with a warming lodge, snack bar and rentals. Visit: oakhillxc.com.

The BREIA Cross-Country Ski Trails in Boonville has 50K of groomed trails and warming huts for classical skiing and snowshoeing. There are three trail systems in diverse landscapes, and trail and facility access is free. Visit: breiax-countryski.org.

In Lake Placid, these smaller areas also offer skiing: Whiteface Club & Resort's Nordic Center (whitefaceclubresort.com) with 15K of gentle, groomed trails and ski/snowshoe rentals and lessons, and Lake Placid Club Nordic Center (lakeplacidcp.com) in Lake Placid with 20K of groomed trails for skiing and snowshoeing with rentals.

While not a ski center, the **Jackrabbit Trail** (lakeplacid.com) links Keene, Lake
Placid and Saranac Lake. The Adirondack
Ski Touring Council maintains 55K of
trails through ungroomed backcountry trail and groomed ski centers. It's no
charge except for through the ski centers.
Snowshoeing is permitted.







Kent's cape and I flew through the best race of my entire season. One of our longabsent club members, Dave Hannon, a freelancer for Trail Runner magazine, read my SnoNews sagas and decided to return to the fold explaining, "I thought the idea was funny, creative and really hit the spirit of snowshoeing on the mark." (SnoNews 8.6). Dave just about tore the target from the back of the selected wearer and blasted through without letting anyone in his immediate vicinity pass him.

Recently, I asked Jim how he came up with the concept and he admitted he thought it an oddball idea that might actually work. This season we have two vests waiting in the wings, one for the frontrunners and another for those farther behind. Not only does the target wearer skim the snow faster, but those close behind benefit from an encouraging share of white crystal pixie dust.

Another innovation has been the proliferation of Northeast series races. Matt Westerlund of Lacona is pulling together the Empire State Snowshoe Series, sponsored by Dion Snowshoes, and with a points system similar to WMAC. While Matt is based in the magical Tug Hill, where snowfall is measured in feet, not inches, his series will include events all over the state. This will provide a doable challenge to those wishing to further explore New York's possibilities as well as provide an opportunity to meet and greet an entire new range of competitors. While a few of these races are part of the Dion WMAC Series, some like Mendon Ponds Winterfest in Rochester are not. The series will culminate with the Empire State Snowshoe Championship at Camp Gorham, Eagle Bay on March 5. Visit empirestatesnowshoe.org for further information.

On a more serious note, Chris Dunn, a New Hampshire exercise physiologist on the Acidotic Racing Team has organized the Northeast Snowshoe Federation to recognize excellence and to encourage top runners to make snowshoe racing their winter focus. According to Chris, "Competitors must have competed in at least five races to be listed in the Federation Cup standings." Only the top ten in each of four categories will be cup winners: Open Men/Women and Masters Men/Women. In future years, Chris anticipates expanding the standings to include Juniors and Super Masters. More information is on nesnowshoefederation.org.

And that is only the tip of the proverbial iceberg, so visit the Dion Snowshoes site. You will discover more regional groupings from the Granite State Series and Winter Wild Series (uphill and down a ski area) in New Hampshire, to Eastern Ontario Series, to the Braveheart Series in the upper Midwest - home of the 2011 USSSA Championship in Cable, Wisconsin.

We have come a long way from the 1990s when there were just a few events, journeying back into our past where each region hosted fun snowshoeing opportunities throughout the winter. In fact, it would be fun to take the cue from our forebears and experiment with snowshoe hurdling and snowshoe softball! You don't have to be fast and you don't have to be



experienced, because with a snowshoe learning curve of roughly two minutes, you will soon be set to enjoy the winter outdoors with a whole new group of friends.



Among the variety of improvements at the ski resorts, a certain theme rings clear. Each ski area listens to its guests and is creating the best possible experience for their extended family of snowsports enthusiasts.

New York

Belleayre Mountain – Belleayre's continued improvements allow it to be the Catskills' only "cat-access" skiing and snowboarding, with a widened and improved halfpipe and Area 51 terrain park. With 47 trails, parks and glades, eight lifts, including their new high speed quad, Belleayre has certainly avolved.

Big Tupper – Big Tupper reopened last year after a ten-year hiatus to much fanfare, staffed with volunteers. This year they are hoping to open a new chairlift to the top of the mountain that will run on Saturdays and Sundays, giving skiers and riders 1,200 feet of vertical. The Wild Center and Big Tupper are partnering again to offer skiers a great day on and off the slopes for just \$15.

Catamount – At Catamount, snowmaking has been continually expanded and improved. More than 98-percent of terrain is covered, using updated versions of the snow guns invented nearly 40 years ago. In recent years, boardercross was moved to Sunrise and expanded for double the fun.

Gore Mountain — Burnt Ridge Mountain will introduce a 3,500-foot glade called Barkeater, which will connect guests from the summit of Burnt Ridge Mountain to Roaring Brook Bridge. From there, skiers and riders can either access the base of the Burnt Ridge Quad or Little Gore Mountain trails that connect to the historic North Creek Ski Bowl. Five new trails will add three miles and 19 acres of terrain for all abilities, serviced by the new Hudson Chair: Peaceful Valley, Oak Ridge, Moxham, Half 'n' Half Glade, and 46er.

Hickory Ski Center – Long known for steep natural terrain and tree skiing, along with a family friendly atmosphere, Hickory reopened last year under new ownership that is restoring its former glory. Guests will enjoy a refurbished lodge, updated and reliable lifts, groomed beginner and intermediate trails, steep ungroomed expert trails, along with a contemporary online lift ticket purchasing system.

Hunter Mountain – Hunter is opening with many improvements, including a new Leitner-Poma six-pack chairlift, the Kaatskill Flyer, which has replaced the AA Snowlite Express Quad. Hunter's zipline project, the Skyrider Tour, will open for year-round operation in December. It's the longest and highest zipline and canopy tour in North America. Plus, 150 energy-efficient snowguns have been installed

Maple Ski Ridge – This year Maple offers two terrain parks located on their main hills. Each park has its own skill level, so they hope this adds hours of enjoyment for their skiing and riding friends. Snowmaking with water from their own ponds means less draw on the environment and it also means snow in their back yard when there's none in yours.

McCauley Mountain – McCauley provides skiing for all levels along with terrain of a big mountain resort without long lift lines and high ticket prices.

Average annual snowfall is 281 inches, but just in case, there's snowmaking on 65-percent of the trails. The "Crazy Fridays" special with \$12 lift tickets from January to April (non-holiday) is a popular program.

Oak Mountain – At Oak, they have added a new progression park with smaller versions of terrain features for skiers and riders. They're opening new glade trails to explore between existing trails, and are adding new fun events. Matt and Laura O'Brien, with 19 years of ski industry experience, have been hired to manage Oak. Rentals are now run by Beaver Brook Outfitters and the concession is by The Oxbow Inn.

Plattekill Mountain – Plattekill has added 22 more snowguns for more snow on the trails faster, and a new Bombardier groomer to make even better surfaces. They've made several base lodge improvements including a new outdoor grill food service area. Plattekill has expanded the children's ski school programs, expanded the terrain park, and kids ages 7-under ski free all season.

Royal Mountain – Royal has continued their ongoing snowmaking and grooming upgrades, which has added 20-percent more snowmaking capabilities for this winter. Yearly improvements now enable us to cover 95-percent of the ski area with snow. Royal has three chair lifts which are capable of moving over 3,000 skiers per hour up the mountain.

Titus Mountain – Titus's 50th season has arrived with ten lifts servicing 27 trails and 1,200 vertical-feet of winter fun. Ninety-percent of their terrain is covered by snowmaking and they groom daily to insure optimum conditions.

West Mountain — West is celebrating its 50th season with a new ticketing system, where skiers and riders can get a reusable card and purchase ski time online for improved convenience. They've also added five high-efficiency snowmaking fans, opened several new connector trails, and spruced up the base lodge.

Whiteface — In *SKI* magazine's most recent survey, Whiteface was the top ski resort in the eastern US. And for the 18th consecutive year, they were chosen number-one for the off-hill activities. Over the past ten years Whiteface, with 283 skiable acres and 86 trails, has invested in a gondola, chairlifts, snowmaking and grooming, terrain parks, and upgrades to the base lodge. Whiteface opened Lookout Mountain in 2009 and last season added 25 acres of glade skiing with the Sugar Glades.

Willard Mountain – At Willard, they've made many investments, including a new groomer, new snowmaking equipment for full coverage, significant trail lighting upgrades, and base lodge renovations. "New York's coolest little ski area" has also expanded their full-service ski shop.

Windham Mountain – This year Windham is celebrating their 50th anniversary with special events each weekend to celebrate the Windham Mountaineers and this milestone year. They have begun a partnership with the nearby Windham Country Club in which they'll run their food operations, create a cross-country ski and snowshoe center, and open a retail shop.

Massachusetts

Berkshire East – For 35 years this family run resort has been offering great skiing terrain at affordable prices. In the last couple of years, Berkshire East

has invested in the infrastructure of the mountain, adding a new chair lift, 56 new snow guns, dramatically expanded pumping capabilities, and three new groomers.

Bousquet – This ski and summer playground, three miles from downtown Pittsfield, is known for its family atmosphere, affordable rates and diverse terrain, producing five Olympians. In 2010, Bousquet was recognized as "Best of the Berkshires" in downhill skiing.

Jiminy Peak – In the Northern Berkshires, Jiminy has quietly carved out a national reputation as a top 5 family mountain. You'll find a classic New England base village with restaurants, lodging, instructional programs and more. Their terrain has 45 skiing and riding trails and challenges for every level. It's also home to the Mountain Adventure Park and the new Aerial Adventure Park.

Otis Ridge — At Otis Ridge you will find the facilities of a larger ski area, yet they're small enough to be the friendly, family area. Their snowmaking equipment adds to what mother nature provides, and their northeastern exposure protects the cover.

Ski Butternut – With 110 skiable acres, a large ski school, and seven-lane tubing center, they've got big mountain skiing close to home. Butternut has added 30 more top gun tower snowguns, added even more rental equipment (including Telemark), and added more features in the terrain park.

Vermont

Bromley Mountain — Bromley went on a shopping spree and brought home goods, systems and equipment to enhance the experience of skiers and riders. A Prinoth Bison winch-cat that will groom the steepest terrain with relative ease. More than 300 new sets of rental equipment from Head. New ticketing software from Siriusware to streamline ticketing and ski school purchases. And a newly constructed drop off area, enhancing guests' arrival and improving traffic flow into and out of the entry plaza.

Burke Mountain – This season, Burke is excited to introduce two new value cards. The Kingdom Sampler and the Ski Free Card are designed to introduce guests to the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont and save money on lift tickets.

Jay Peak — Jay Peak welcomes visitors this winter with major improvements. Topping the list are increases in snowmaking coverage, an enclosed beginner lift, a new Nordic center, an indoor ice arena, a parking garage, a state-of-the-art ticketing system, and a new groomer. The enhancements are part of the resort's ongoing revitalization effort.

Killington – Snowmaking upgrades top the list of summer projects. In addition to building up its arsenal of lower energy snow guns, Killington will continue to improve the overall efficiency of its snowmaking system. Crews have completed trail regrading on the upper Skyewalker/Bittersweet area to improve skier/rider flow and reduce congestion. They also regraded the top portion of Bittersweet where it intersects Great Eastern.

Mad River Glen – Over 15 years of co-op ownership, Mad River Glen has invested more than \$4 million in capital improvements. Their goal is to maintain and preserve the experience rather than overhaul or upgrade it. Both the skier-owners and the management understand that skiers come to Mad

River for the unique combination of legendary terrain, sense of community, low skier density and intimate atmosphere.

Magic Mountain – In an effort to save Magic, and raise capital to invest in the infrastructure, the ski area has begun selling shares in the area. They continue to improve the snowmaking operations with increased efficiency through renovated air and water snowmaking lines and a streamlined process to making snow. The Magic Card offers discounts for skiers and riders all season long for only \$39.00. In its second season, the Magic-Pack, offers a tremendous savings on day tickets throughout the season.

Mount Snow — With the most fan guns in North America, Mount Snow continues its pursuit of the perfect snow conditions, with off-season improvements to its snowmaking infrastructure. You can't say Mount Snow and not think about events. In the spring time, things heat up with the Carinthia Open, Reggaefest, Winter Brewer's Festival and the Gladeiator. That's not to count out college weeks in January where eager students get one last chance to blow off some steam before returning to the books.

Okemo – The Mountain Coaster, a four-season family attraction will offer an exhilarating ride through alpine forests at Jackson Gore. Sled-like cars carrying 1-2 people will ascend 1,600 feet followed by a 375 vertical-foot descent along 3,100 feet of track. Okemo continues its commitment to grooming this winter with the addition of a third Prinoth BR500 grooming machine. Okemo's final Poma surface lift is replaced with a 180-foot, magic-carpet-style gurface lift.

Pico Mountain – With more vertical drop than 80-percent of New England mountains, Pico offers mogul trails, glades, groomed cruisers and the new Triple Slope terrain park, all of which lead back to one classically-styled Vermont base lodge. Pico's 50 trails, 214 skiable acres and seven lifts (including two high-speed quads) mean their slopes are never crowded and guests make the most out of their days.

Smugglers' Notch — Winter guests at Smugglers' will be among the first to enjoy the resort's new year-round canopy tour, located in a scenic valley near the village. Participants on the three-hour tour, the first of its kind in Vermont, will ride more than 4,000 feet of zip line cable, cross suspension bridges, and rappel from trees. Scenic lookout and tree platforms in a mature forest of hemlock, white birch and sugar maple will yield stunning views of the resort and Green Mountains.

Stowe – A cultural enhancement has come to Stowe as Spruce Peak Arts Center opens its doors this month. This 420-seat year-round performing arts center is a venue for a wide spectrum of events: theater, music, dance, film, comedy, lectures and multimedia presentations.

Stratton – 2002 Olympic gold medalist Ross Powers returns to his roots at Stratton Mountain School as the new head of snowboarding programs. Stratton will upgrade two of its front line Snow Cats with new Prinoth BR350s, with technology and efficiency upgrades in snowmaking. Improvements will be focused around terrain parks and the tubing park with a new warming hut added to the ticket purchasing area where guests can sit around a bonfire.

Sugarbush – Sugarbush is currently undergoing its largest revitalization effort since opening the Lincoln Peak village in 2006. Phase two of the Lincoln Peak project consists of a new entrance plaza as well as two new lodges. The 12,500-square foot Schoolhouse is housing some of their children's programs, and the other lodge will provide skier services. Over two miles of primary-supply snowmaking pipe were replaced at both Lincoln Peak and Mt. Ellen. ♣



When Olavi Hirvonen, owner of Lapland Lake Nordic Vacation Center was an infant, he was sent to live in Finland with his grandmother. "She believed in dreams," Olavi recalled in a recent interview. So it is not surprising that he too, is a strong believer in the power of his own psychic dreams. But, I am getting ahead of the story. Let us begin at the beginning.

It was 1930 in Montreal, Canada when the parents of eight-month-old Olavi Hirvonen decided that the child would have a better chance of survival in their homeland and sent baby Olavi to be raised by his maternal grandmother in the tiny city of Koivisto, Finland. When his mother came to visit him, five years later, he was already showing signs of athletic prowess especially on skis. Olavi skied along behind his uncle, played on skis, and like most Scandinavian children, skied to and from school during the long winter months. "I remember using my uncle's hand-medown skis and poles. The poles had great big baskets, but no handles," said Olavi.

Soon the boy began to enjoy racing on skis with the other Finnish children. Olavi, who turns 80 this month, still remembers winning his first ski race. "I took home the prize, a wooden ruler," he recalls. His competitive spirit and athletic talents continued to blossom with skiing, running, soccer, log-rolling and Finnish baseball.

Olavi's childhood home was on an island where he grew to enjoy nature's gifts. "The water was my home. The fishing was great and I loved to help my 16-year old uncle with repairs to the family home damaged during the war," he reported. At 17, he served in the Finnish army for six months. In 1949, at age 19, he decided to join his mother who had moved to New York City from Montreal.

With other Scandinavian immigrants, Olavi soon found places to ski and ski race in the New York area. "I was 21 when I got married and three months later received a 'Greetings' from the US Army," reported Olavi. After basic training he was sent to Alaska where he served as an instructor for Army arctic indoctrination school. His students were officers of all ranks in the Army. He skied days and nights with his men, pulling supply sleds, building snow caves and arctic lean-tos, and learning other winter survival techniques. Olavi attained

American citizenship, and lived off-base with his wife and infant son, Esa, who was born in Fairbanks, Alaska. After two years of military service, the Hirvonens moved to Vermont in pursuit of Olavi's business dreams. They leased a ski lodge in Jeffersonville, near Smugglers' Notch, and worked diligently seven days a week to provide quality services for 50 guests.

Olavi continued to enter cross-country ski races on winter weekends and in 1959 was tapped by the US Ski Association for a berth on the US Nordic Ski Team. "I was proud to be selected to represent the United States, and was eligible for racing in the upcoming Olympics at Squaw Valley, Calif., but I could not take time off to train with the ski team," remembers Olavi. "I had a family and a business to run. I packed a ski trail behind the lodge and trained myself at night which turned out to be good for my agility and balance," said the determined ski team racer. Olavi arrived at the US Ski Team training camp in Colorado just a week before the 1960 Olympic Games tryouts, overcame the difficulties of skiing at high altitude, and bested all but one of his teammates in the tryouts for the Olympic squad.

Olavi was confident in his ability to perform well at the Olympics and told the ski team coach "I feel good enough to race in all of them" when asked which of the Olympic races he preferred. Though known to be best in the 30K, he was assigned instead to race the 15K, an event he had not trained for. Then he had the bad fortune to break a ski in the 50-kilometer and finished a disappointed 26th.

After skiing in the Olympics Games, Olavi managed a restaurant, worked at Stowe Ski Center, and spent several years in the construction business while continuing to ski recreationally with his wife and young son. Like his father, Esa loved to cross-country ski and became quite proficient at skiing and shooting. He was

named to the US Biathlon Team, but a tragic motorcycle accident claimed his life weeks before he was to report to the biathlon training camp. Many years later Esa came to Olavi in a dream. "In the morning I told my wife that I had a vision of holding a map of New York State while our son put his finger on the map and pointed to the Amsterdam exit off the Thruway."

Olavi forgot about the dream until one spring afternoon when they were driving on the Thruway and decided to get off at Amsterdam to travel north on NY Route 30. "I was hoping to find a big piece of land for a ski touring center, when I spotted the sign for the hamlet of Benson, and felt compelled to turn off the highway onto that tiny road. In fact, twice we were driving north on Route 30 looking for property when something required me to turn onto County Road 6 (Benson Road). A resident told us about a nearby camp for sale. It had 250 acres with a beautiful lake and numerous buildings. It sounded perfect, surely, a dream come true."


The rest they say is history. Indeed, Olavi swears that his son had been to visit Grant Cottages, the summer camp in Benson that was to become Lapland Lake Nordic Vacation Center. Olavi was able to negotiate a fair price and purchased the property in 1978. He was remarried several years later to the former Ann Macartney and continued to renovate the cottages – "tupas" in Finnish. They expanded the business to become one of the "Best Nordic Ski Resorts in America" and winner of numerous Top Ten awards for excellence.

Ann had been an active member of the Capital District Ski Touring Association, when she took lessons and skied with the former Olympian. "Olavi and I skied together on occasion for a couple years. He watched my skiing and gave me lots of great skiing tips. Eventually, we went on a date," recalls Ann. "I really wasn't looking for a partner then, but here I am happily married to Olavi and to our wonderful vacation resort, 25 years later."

Olavi works seven days a week at Lapland Lake and grooms the trails himself daily, depending on the conditions. After grooming the trails, he works in the ski shop selling skis and doing repairs. He is the heart of the operation. There's not as much time to ski for pleasure but Olavi's passion for the sport and sharing it with others through Lapland Lake and the business he and Ann have built together makes up for it.

Olavi Hirvonen is certain that he received guidance from his son Esa in a dream directing him to the magnificent property and lake at the foot of Cathead Mountain in Benson. "My daydream about owning a Nordic ski center became a reality and a successful adventure because my son came to me in my night dream. Like my dear Finnish grandmother who raised me, I believe with all my heart that Esa guided me to the fulfillment of my real dream."

CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING & SNOWSHOEING

wo primary trails lead south from Wanakena, from which all other trails in the northern Five Ponds Wilderness radiate. This is the High Falls Loop Trail, the history of which is as central to the region as its location.

The western half of the loop follows the grade of the logging railroad built by the Rich Lumber Company around 1902, which paralleled the Oswegatchie River and ended in the vicinity of The Plains. Trains used it only for the decade that the company was operating in the area. Later, after the land was acquired for the Forest Preserve, the state developed the route into the High Falls Truck Trail for the purpose of fire protection and management by the state. After the designation of the Five Ponds Wilderness, all motor vehicle use ceased except for the first mile.

The eastern leg also begins along another of the Rich Lumber Company's logging railroad beds, this one ending at Dead Creek Flow on Cranberry Lake. Beyond, it becomes a more rugged foot trail, traversing a rolling countryside as it angles southwest through the Glasby Creek valley.

The total distance for the complete loop, with a visit to High Falls, is 15.7 miles, making this a very long day's ski trip. Day hikers with less ambitious schedules are happy going only as far as High Rock or Janacks Landing. With a backpack the loop can easily be broken up into segments - assuming you don't mind spending a cold night in the lean-to at High Falls.

HOW TO GET THERE

The trailheads for the High Falls Loop are located in Wanakena, near Cranberry Lake. To find them, follow County Road 61 south from NY Route 3, bearing right at two intersections onto South Shore Road. At 1.2 miles you cross the bridge over the Oswegatchie River, and at 1.3 miles you should look for a road turning off to the right. The western half of the trail begins here, but you cannot park here because a nearby residence requires it for access to a driveway. Parking has traditionally been accommodated at a small turnoff about 100 feet further along South Shore Road, just past a tennis court.

The eastern leg begins another 0.4mile down the road, 1.7 miles south of Route 3. There is a formal parking area here, which can hold about ten cars.

THE WESTERN TRAIL

After passing a residence, the old roadbed passes a former millpond and then crosses Skate Creek at 0.6-mile. After roughly half an hour you come to a large wetland on the right. It is filled with mag-



nificently tall, dead standing timber and gives you an immediate feeling of being deep in the wilderness. The Albany Road, which was built in 1812 to connect Albany with the St. Lawrence River, once passed through this area.

Two hours and 3.9 miles from Wanakena, you arrive at a fork in the trail. A right turn will take you to High Rock, a rocky bluff on the edge of the Oswegatchie River, about 0.1-mile away. Almost everyone makes the side trip for the view, and in fact many day hikers only travel this far on skis and snowshoes. High Rock offers the widest view of the river anywhere.

The High Falls Loop swings left at the fork and descends to cross a stream on a concrete bridge at 4.3 miles, less than ten minutes from the High Rock intersection. One-half-hour past High Rock, you cross a stream on a substantial beaver dam. If the beaver return, the trail may be flooded here for up to 200 feet. The trail soon makes a broad swing to the left, and passes an old gravel pit and another wetland to meet the river at Ross Rapids at 6.8 miles. At 7.4 miles you reach the junction with the blue-marked trail to Five Ponds.

Heading east, the trail is often flooded as it crosses a stream and you must step carefully across the ice to avoid getting wet feet. At 7.9 miles you arrive at Carters Landing, named for Cornelius Carter, a guide who had a camp at the north end of The Plains. Glasby Creek flows into the river in this area, and beavers have built their dams right next to the trail. Wetness is a perennial problem, so beware of weak spots in the ice.

The trail now skirts the southern edge of The Plains, a large open expanse that extends almost a mile to the northeast. The western leg of the High Falls Loop meets the eastern leg at an intersection at 8.6 miles. Left leads back to Wanakena, and right is the spur to High Falls, another 0.4-mile away. The falls are a 15-foot drop on the Oswegatchie River and are apt to be concealed in ice in winter. The lean-to on the far bank should be considered out-ofreach by winter hikers - there is no bridge, and ice or no ice there is no safe and reliable way across the river. The lean-to on the east bank is more than adequate for a lunch stop, and it is perfectly suited for a winter overnight if you are so inclined.

THE WESTERN TRAIL

The eastern leg is shorter but more rugged than the western leg. Beginning at the junction near The Plains, the trail makes a serpentine course through a blowdown area, winding sharply between broken logs and upturned root masses as it rises over a knoll and descends on the other side. This is a tortuous route for winter skiers! A 50-foot pine log forms a sturdy bridge over a wet glen, though winter hikers will find it not very useful.

You pass out of the blowdown, and pass through a pine forest dotted by the occasional beaver pond as you meander to the base of Threemile Mountain. Three small waterfalls at various points tumble down from the mountain's shoulder on the right, their streams disappearing toward the Glasby Creek area on the left.

Relatively new bridges simplify what used to be a tricky crossing of Glasby Creek, and then you ascend slightly to an intersection called Sand Hill Junction. Right leads to Glasby Pond and beyond. It may take you two hours to cover the 2.7 miles from The Plains.


What follows is an enjoyable descent, especially on skis. The grade is moderate, though you may need to watch out for an abrupt ending at a stream crossing. At 3.5 miles you reach the side trail to Janacks Landing, a lean-to on Cranberry Lake's Dead Creek Flow. In the deep freeze of winter, most

travelers take this side trail and cut across the width of the flow. Otherwise, the loop trail makes a 0.9-mile detour around the tip of the flow. If you take the winter shortcut,

the distance is reduced to just 0.4-mile.

The last 1.9 miles between Dead Creek Flow and Wanakena are on the second of the two railroad beds. The grades are so easy that you can cover the distance in 45 minutes.

Speedskating Marathon on December 18-19

LAKE PLACID - Long track marathon speed skating is coming to Lake Placid on Saturday-Sunday, December 18-19 for the annual Lake Placid Speedskating Marathon. A Marathon Skating International and Lake Placid Speed Skating Club event, the marathon is one of several in a series of ice marathons that take place throughout North America.

The race distances include 10K, 25K and 40K, which translates to 25 laps, 40 laps, and 104 laps skated on the 400-meter Olympic Speedskating Oval. Skaters ranging in age from ten to 80 have been known to participate, and racers are from the US and Canada. Marathon skating is a popular discipline in North America but even more so in Europe. A popular race in Holland, Elfstedentocht ("Eleven Cities Tour"), started the tradition of skating long distances. Marathon racing is especially popular in Canada, and many marathons are held there - one of the most well-known is the Big Rideau Lake Speedskating Marathon in Portland, Ontario. Lake Placid is one of the few venues in the US that hosts a skating marathon every year.

Lake Placid Speed Skating Club will be hosting more speedskating races, the Charles Jewtraw All-Around (all distances) on Saturday-Sunday, January 8-9, and the Jack Shea Sprints (sprint distances) to be announced. Visit: lakeplacidspeed.sports. officelive.com. - Christie Sausa

The inspiration for Icespike was frustration caused by injuries on bad conditions and difficulties with traditional traction devices. Slip-on systems with straps, coils and chains were heavy and uncomfortable. They caused abnormal muscle stress, shifted on the shoe, wore out rapidly, resulting in gait injuries and lost training time. Homemade "screw shoes" wore out quickly and had poor grip.

Input from engineers in the family and American ingenuity gave rise to a solution: a traction device from hardened high carbon steel to withstand abuse, provide surface penetration and unsurpassed durability - with negligible weight and no change in mechanics. The Icespike Deluxe package includes 32 ice spikes and tool to install the ice spikes directly to the sole of any shoe or boot. Place 10-12 ice spikes on the edges of the outsole for control and stability, leaving 8-12 ice spikes for replacements. Icespike can be removed and will not damage the outsole. Visit: icespike.com.

sometimes wonder what my life would have been like. For many of us, there comes a time when we must make a decision that ultimately guides us from that point forward. For better or worse, there is a pivotal moment requiring a choice that will later serve as the starting point of countless stories to be told. In this particular instance, those were the words of a man for whom you probably do not know, but for whose decision to jump at a rare opportunity led to something that is known around the world. His name is Mike McKeeman (a 2:17 marathoner), and in 2005, he accepted an invitation to become Deena Kastor's training partner. A year later, she set the American record in the marathon of 2:19:36 – with him by her side for 22 miles of that race, and more importantly, hundreds of miles before it.

Twenty months before, Mike and I spent 90 minutes running side by side at 7,000 feet elevation on a dirt road beneath snow covered mountains in Mammoth Lakes, Calif., I was at the Running USA industry conference in La Jolla, an upscale town near San Diego. On the final night, a live auction was held in conjunction with dinner that I had no interest in participating in until my eyes fell upon the "Team Running USA – Mammoth Lakes Trip." Advertised as a four-day/threenight training trip with Terrence Mahon and his team, including the likes of Meb Keflezighi, Ryan Hall, and Deena Kastor - all four of whom were sitting in the very room I was in - I was in awe. On October 4, 2010, I was eating dinner sitting next to Meb in Deena's dining room.

The day before I left for Mammoth, my business, ARE Event Productions, worked the Komen Race for the Cure in Albany. The previous weekend we had timed six events and while I was glad we only had to do one, it was particularly important to me that it go seamlessly. I knew that when I left the next morning I would want the peace of mind to truly disappear for the four days. No emails, no phone calls,

nothing to interrupt what surely was to be one of the most memorable experiences I will ever have. Just a few minutes after grabbing lunch with the timing crew, I got out for an easy 12-mile run, did laundry, packed, and happily noticed that my inbox was basically empty. All had gone well.

"There's Meb!" echoed in my head as we finished up the afternoon run. When we arrived at the Snowcreek Athletic Club an hour earlier, I wandered around for a few minutes before we grouped up to start the "relaxed" four-mile run on the neighboring streets and trails. The hallways of the athletic club had numerous framed photos and magazine articles about Meb and Deena - particularly impressive, though, was not only that they had signed all of these materials, but also this was the actual gym they train in! After quickly reading an article, I took a few steps, turned to my left, and Deena was standing right there. Talk about having the characters come to life!

Upon returning to the gym after the run, I saw Meb. The silver medalist in the marathon at the 2004 Olympic Games and 2009 NYC Marathon champion was now a few feet in front of me, doing drills. Later that night, he and I would be sitting next to one another at dinner.

What life is this? What life this is! I took a philosophy course in college to fulfill a requirement, but found myself intrigued by it, namely the ideas and beliefs regarding both civilization, in general, as well as what motivates us. As I sat in the hot tub naked and alone with just the sounds of artificially heated water and the swaying trees, I curiously thought to myself about where I am, both literally and figuratively. For as much as I am alone when working during the week now, my mind is occupied with the work I am doing. Here I was, once again alone to my thoughts, except this time it wasn't thoughts of what to write in an email or where to place volunteers on a race course, rather it was a moment of introspection, of how are you, Josh?

Much of my life these days is dictated

by time. What **time** should the crew arrive. how much time until the start, what was the winning time, how much more time left on that playlist, gas in the generator, battery in the clock, time until we need to close the roads, get the volunteers in position, lay the equipment out. Tick-tock, ticktock... Week in, week out... Organization, responsibility, accountability, pressure, and a reliance on the team working each and every event – sometimes upwards of six each week - are doing their jobs, meeting the deadlines for which there exists no possible extension... And my insatiable attraction to the energy and effort that goes into it.

As this whirlwind of contemplation and reflection twirled in my head a few inches above the swirl of the water, I caught myself and cleared my mind. For a brief moment, I once again focused on what my eyes were seeing and not merely had them open while removed from their vision. It was tranquil. It was beautiful. And I graciously reminded myself to appreciate this ephemeral experience. A few minutes later, I would lie down for a two-hour nap... At 1pm on a Tuesday.

On Wednesday afternoon, it was with some degree of melancholy that I saw the Snowcreek Athletic Club come into view. Much like a movie for which you already know the ending, the remaining pieces of the puzzle that would show my return to

New York were coming together with little left to hide the truth: my trip was ending. While the team worked out, I wandered around again, looking at the pictures and reading the poster-size articles showcasing some of the talents that have been developed within the structure's walls. Without closing my eyes, I could see myself as a child, aspiring to one day be on that poster: A medalist in the Olympics!

How many of us as young athletes have been motivated by that wondrous possibility, enchanted with the dream to excel beyond all expectations and capabilities! And yet, now as an adult, accepting my place and where I am, I couldn't help but laugh to myself: I may not be on that poster, but I just got out for a run with Meb, and heck, Deena made me dinner the other night! As hall of fame track and field coach, Bob Larsen, dropped me off at the airport and we shared our final words, one thing was for sure: this was the trip of a lifetime!
